Literacy Tests Set For New Voters

The New York State Board of Elections has announced that it will require all new voters in public schools from 3 P. M. to 10 P. M. on Oct. 8 and 9, and from 7 P. M. to 10 P. M. on Oct. 11.

According to the new state election law, a new voter must be able to read and write English.

Such a voter, native or foreign born, is one who became qualified to vote in the state after Jan. 1, 1952, but who has not voted in New York State previously.
